Whitechapel Gallery receives lifeline grant from Government's £1.57bn Culture Recovery Fund

Whitechapel Gallery has been awarded £534,000 as part of the Government's £1.57 billion Culture Recovery Fund (CRF) to help face the challenges of the coronavirus pandemic and to ensure they have a sustainable future, the Culture Secretary has announced.

Whitechapel Gallery is one of 1,385 cultural and creative organisations across the country receiving urgently needed support. £257 million of investment has been announced as part of the very first round of the Culture Recovery Fund grants programme being administered by Arts Council England. Further rounds of funding in the cultural and heritage sector are due to be announced over the coming weeks.

The gallery made an application to reflate their reserves, to enable the gallery to weather the ongoing challenges of the coronavirus pandemic. This vital boost will allow the gallery to continue to play a pivotal role in London's cultural landscape, and deliver an ambitious programme of exhibitions, artist commissions, educational activities and a rich events programme to its audiences.

Iwona Blazwick, Director, Whitechapel Gallery, said: '*The Cultural Recovery Fund offers a vital lifeline of support for Whitechapel Gallery and a further 1,384 arts organisations across the UK. We are delighted and relieved to receive £534,000 from Arts Council England to reflate our reserves. With this we can plan for a secure future for the Gallery, with the continued upkeep of our historic building, innovation in our programmes, and commitment to engaging local, national and international audiences. Now more than ever cultural organisations have a crucial role to play, offering inspiring and healing experiences as we face the pandemic, economic and environmental crisis and social change.*'

Culture Secretary **Oliver Dowden** said: *'This funding is a vital boost for the theatres, music venues, museums and cultural organisations that form the soul of our nation. It will protect these special places, save jobs and help the culture sector's recovery.*
